ADVENT IS WAITING IN PRAYER

Dear friends, as we begin this period of Advent, we are beginning a time of waiting, a time of longing, a time of hoping, a time of watching, a time of yearning and expecting ... seems like life is all about that. Life is Advent.

Advent means coming and simply put, Advent is the season when we prepare for the coming of Christ at Christmas.

Advent is the time when we get our hearts ready for the greatest Christmas gift – namely Jesus Christ. We believe that Christ comes in three ways. Yes, He has come already at Bethlehem on that first Christmas. This is the first coming of our Lord, the one we are most familiar with and celebrate every Christmas.

He also comes to us now, every day, in such mysterious ways, as in prayer, grace, word, and sacraments. These are other ways that Our Lord comes to us. The word for the celebration of the Lord's birth, "Christmas" – literally, "Christ's Mass" – hints at that coming as well.

Then there is yet another coming of Jesus. Christ will come at the end of time, as judge of the living and dead. So, there are three comings of Jesus Christ. Christ did come in the past, Christ does come right now, and Christ will come in the future. If you don't mind me saying it in a poetic way, our Lord comes to us in history, Our Lord comes to us in mystery and our Lord comes to us in majesty. He comes in history as the Holy Infant of Bethlehem. He comes to us now in mystery – in words, sacrament, grace, and mercy. He will come in majesty at the end of the world as judge of the living and dead.

This is the threefold coming of Christ that we contemplate during this blessed season of Advent. May we have a grace filled season of Advent, prepare well our hearts to receive our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

History of the Advent Wreath

The origin of the Advent wreath has been traced back to Germany, though the exact dates are unknown.

Historians have suggested that pre-Christian Germanic peoples would light candles around wreaths in the dark winter months in anticipation of the warmer, lighter months in springtime. This tradition likely evolved into an "Advent wreath" at some point during the Middle Ages,



transforming the pagan tradition into a Christian one. Rev. William Saunders explained that "By 1600, both Catholics and Lutherans had more formal practices surrounding the Advent wreath." Ultimately, the Advent wreath tradition spread beyond Germany and into other areas of the world, namely throughout the western Church.

Advent Wreath Meaning

The circular shape of the Advent wreath symbolizes God's infinite love for us – it is never-ending, just like the true Light of the World, Jesus, who leads us into eternal life with Him. The materials of the Advent wreath similarly lead us to reflect on the everlasting nature of God; traditionally, Advent wreaths have been made of evergreen leaves, such as pine or fir, which maintain their green color beyond the season in which they are collected. Nowadays, there are many modern interpretations of Advent wreaths that still help us celebrate the traditional meaning of the wreath: preparing the way for the Light of the World, Jesus. Battery-operated/LED wreaths are a good example of this as they simulate the four candles but don't require lighting each week.

Advent week 1 – Hope: Prophecy Candle (purple)
Advent week 2 – Peace: Bethlehem Candle (purple)
Advent week 3 – Joy: Shepherd's Candle (pink)
Advent week 4 – Love: Angel's Candle (purple)

Christmas is a time for giving and this is your opportunity to spread some Christmas cheer to the less fortunate in our local community. The Helping Hands ministry at St. Philip Benizi is asking for donations to our food closet. In case you are unfamiliar with this program, Helping Hands provides Christmas and Easter food donations to underserved families within the Oregon City school district.

Food Donations



Helping Hands maintains a small food closet in our Parish Hall. In addition to Christmas and Easter food baskets provided to families received from the Oregon City school district counselors, we can respond to individual needs of food to those identified or referred families. We will serve the hungry regardless of documentation and standard eligibility requirements. Helping Hands relies on food, personal hygiene and monetary donations from our parish members to keep a sufficient food supply in our pantry. Needs not covered by donations are funded through the church's Helping Hands ministry commission budget.

Last Christmas season, our program provided food baskets to 40 families and stockings with \$50 gift cards for 135 children. We will be assisting a similar number of families again this year. Families will pick up their food and gifts on Saturday, December 21st.

Christmas basket items needed include: flour, sugar, stuffing mix, dry beans, chili, soups, canned meats, spaghetti sauce, canned fruit, oatmeal, pancake mix, syrup, jelly, vegetable oil, shampoo/conditioner, toothpaste, laundry soap, dish soap, and toilet paper. Drop off food donations near the doors of the church or bring to the hall.

The deadline to return donated items is Sunday, December 15th.


