THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT ST. JOSEPH – FR. PETER

On this third Sunday of Advent, I would like to focus on a man, a man who is often forgotten during the season of Advent. A man who should be one of the principal characters of Advent, a man I am afraid we neglect. That man is Joseph.

To tell you the truth, Joseph is a man who does not want any attention for himself. He does not want us to pay that much attention to him during Advent. Although Joseph is often forgotten, he can teach us all three very viable lessons. One, Joseph teaches us, THE TREASURE OF SILENCE. Secondly, Joseph teaches us that ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS and third, Joseph teaches us that GOD'S GRACE OVERPOWERS EVERY PRESSURE.

Let us look at each of these lessons: First, THE TREASURE OF SILENCE: Today, we live in a world with too much clutter, noise, and distraction. Rarely do we listen to each other. St. Joseph teaches us the power of silence. Now let

me ask you this: how many recorded words of St. Joseph do we have in the Gospel? Do you know how many? Zero.

We have absolutely no record of St. Joseph ever saying a thing. And yet this is the man closest to Jesus. This is the man without whom the drama of our redemption could not have unfolded in the blessed way that it did. This is a man of intense silence. Silence is often a lot more powerful than talking. Someone once asked St. Padre Pio, what language does God speak? St.

Padre Pio replied, "God speaks the language of silence."

The Bible teaches, be still and know that I am God. Secondly, St. Joseph shows us that ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS. In the first chapters of St. Matthew's Gospel, we are told Joseph had a dream. This dream of his involved an angel who instructs him on how he is to act. The angel says, Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit, she will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save the people from their sins. What does Joseph do after having this dream? The Gospel says that he woke up and then, in these amazing simple words, Joseph did as the Lord commanded

him. Do you realize how profound that statement is? For Joseph there was no debate, no second guessing, no consultations with close friends and relatives, no hedging, and no time to think about it. Joseph hears God's will, in a dream, he knows what it is, and he is going to do it. He is going to do it because for Joseph actions speak louder than words.

Finally, St. Joseph shows us the value of GRACE UNDER PRESSURE. Think of all the emergencies Joseph found himself in during the brief period of his life, as the scriptures reveal to us. Imagine the following crises: Joseph's young to-be-wife is found to be pregnant before they finalize the marriage. She is advanced in her pregnancy when they must travel to faraway Bethlehem.

When it is time for the baby's birth, there is no warm room or bed for the child. Then, they must flee as refugees to Egypt because some tyrannical king wants to kill the baby. And later, Joseph experiences the loss of their child for three days, until finally they find him in the Temple. Joseph went through a lot of pressure, crises, and emergencies, but guess what? God's grace is always sufficient. St. Bernard commented that God never gives us a challenge, or a call, or a duty, without the sufficient grace to accomplish it. And this is ever evident in the life of St. Joseph. A simple carpenter directed by God to undertake a complicated task, for the unfolding of the greatest drama in all human history; and God lavishing upon Joseph the grace necessary to do it.

As we approach Christmas, I know there are some of us whose lives are endless progressions of one crisis to another, one pressure or crisis to another. You wonder if you can get through another day. Think often of St. Joseph. Think how he relied on God's grace to handle the present difficulties with trust and faith in God. Ask him to intercede for you, to give you the same trust and faith, to handle all the pressures that life can sometimes present to us.
